#### Fun Money Facts

You can hold a Ferris wheel in the palm of your hand... How? It's easier than you might think. So is turning cartwheels with your fingers. Both "Ferris wheel" and "cartwheel" are nicknames for silver dollars!

**Coins last a lot longer than bills.** The life expectancy of a circulating coin is 30 years, while paper money usually only lasts for 18 months.

How can you tell where a coin came from? Mint marks show what minting facility your coins came from – "P" for Philadelphia, "D" for Denver and "S" for San Francisco. This mark can be found to the right of the subject's face on the obverse side of each circulating coin, except for the "Philadelphia" Lincoln cent, which has no mint mark.
