some useful tips:

Lower your expectations. Chances are you may not find that high-paying dream job right away. You might even be competing with experienced people for lower-paying jobs. Don't get discouraged.

Interview with confidence. When you land an interview, dress appropriately for the job you're seeking. Speak clearly and look your interviewer in the eye. It's important to demonstrate people skills as well as professionalism.

Stick to it. Follow up in a week if you don't hear back from the company. Be proactive, but be polite. Finding a job takes determination, patience and persistence. Don't give up.
